## Nursery – Chinese New Year

Nursery has been busy celebrating Chinese New Year. We talked about all the different festivals we celebrate and who celebrates them with us. We know that when we celebrate, we are really happy and it is often a time to come with together familv and friends. The children remembered how they celebrated Diwali and Christmas and we talked about the differences and similarities when celebrating Chinese New Year. The children loved learning about Chinese dragons and they worked together to make their own dragon, which we all got inside and then danced around in the garden.



We had a special Chinese banquet and tasted lots of delicious Chinese food too. The children tried to eat noodles with chopsticks.



It was very tricky but they all kept trying (like Ron Resilience!) Well done!

## Reception – Can a Penguin Live in a Hot Place?

This term in Reception we asked the question 'Can a Penguin Live in a Hot Place?' The children were keen to research to find out. We compared hot and cold places by learning about the Arctic and Antarctica, the jungle, and the African Savanna to see if we could find penguins living there. We had fun roleplaying lots of expeditions and explorer adventures. We learnt adjectives to describe the animal's size, shape and colour. We watched video clips carefully to see how they moved and we copied their movements. We also thought about how they might feel if we could touch the animals. We learnt that the animals were well suited for their environments. For example, the shape of penguins' bodies helps them move through the water speedily to catch fish. Giraffes have long necks to help them reach the leaves on the treetops in the African Savannah.



We used the stories of Brown Bear, Brown Bear What Can You See? and in the 'Tall, Tall Grass' to help structure our writing about the animals and made our own explorer books. We had lots of fun trying new activities like exploring ice, melting it to save the trapped penguins, building our own penguin school and playing instruments in time to the Animal Boogie song.



We found out that penguins the Southern live in Hemisphere (the bottom half of the world). They live in Antarctica but also in some like hot countries New Zealand and South Africa. They do not live in the North Pole with Santa (like lots of children thought). Penguins do live in hot places!



Year 1 – Moon Zoom

This half term, we have really enjoyed getting stuck into our 'Moon Zoom' theme. We have been great explorers in History and have loved discovering famous space explorers, like Neil Armstrong and Tim Peake, who have made so many achievements in history. Many of us have decided that we would like to wear a space suit and travel to space one day. We found it very funny that there is no gravity there and enjoyed watching videos of the space station crew floating around in the air and sleeping in special sleeping bags in their small cabins.

Our Design and Technology was awesome this half term! We got to design and create our very own moon buggies that could travel on the moon's crust! It was fascinating discovering how a moon buggy was made and the different components that are needed to make it work properly.



The most exciting part was making a box to sit in the

chassis, for collecting special moon rocks!



In English, we used one of our favourite stories 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt' and changed it to an alien hunt, where we had so much fun bringing the story to life through acting and creating our own alien characters. Here, we thought of lots of exciting language and adjectives to describe and writing make our more interesting.

We have also had a very exciting and important visit from some fighters this half term, who taught us lots of ways to keep ourselves safe. learnt about smoke We alarms, and they showed us what to do in an emergency. We got to see all their special equipment, such as oxygen tanks, rescue cutters, used for opening cars and the hoses. We also got to see the blue lights on and spoke about when to call 999.

It has been another busy half term in Year One, and we have all had so much fun along the way! It has been wonderful to see the children become more independent and resilient, and we couldn't be prouder of their many achievements!

## Year 2 – Land Ahoy

Year 2 have had a brilliant half term exploring their theme, 'Land Ahoy'. Nautical Day was the perfect start, where we spent time exploring the lives of pirates, navigating the world's continents and creating our very own lighthouses.



These were all clues for what was to come and as this half term comes to an end, it's safe to say it has been a good one!





In Maths, the children have done so well to grasp the concepts difficult of multiplication and division. whilst in English they have created their own version of, 'The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch' and even written a story using a film as a stimulus! However, I'm sure the children's favourite part has been investigating the of famous movements explorers before them. The lives of Sir Francis Drake, Christopher Columbus and the Nino brothers were fascinating to explore and we've been able to improve our own map reading skills through the study of oceans, seas and continents in Geography. We might just make pirates of them yet!

## Year 3 – Tremors

This half term, Year Three have been having a blast during our topic of Tremors! We began the year by creating realistic globes out of papier mâché and painting them.



We also put together awesome exploding volcanoes out of water bottles and plasticine - we made the lava bv mixing together vinegar, baking soda and, of course, red food colouring! It was an extremely messy day, but lots of us thought that was the best part! Since then, we have learnt all about volcanoes, earthquakes and tsunamis - did you know that the earth has four layers and that the hottest layer can reach temperatures of up to 6000 degrees Celsius?! Furthermore, we learnt all about rocks and fossils. finding out all about igneous, metamorphic and sedimentary rocks. Did you know that there are three types of fossils: trace fossils, body fossils and chemical fossils?



To finish off our fantastic half term, we visited the Natural History Museum.



We explored the different layers of the earth, had a terrifying experience in an earthquake simulator and were amazed by the many fossils on display! We all thoroughly enjoyed the trip, as well as the entire half term!

## Year 4 – Road Trip USA

Year 4 have had a busy but amazing half term studying our 'Road Trip USA' theme. We had a special visitor from Love Theatre Arts deliver an engaging and fun line dancing workshop (pictured).







In English this half term we've studied Native American myths, written postcards and persuasive adverts and learnt about the American Civil War. For Geography, we've learnt about the different states of the USA as well as expanding our knowledge of latitude and longitude and how these are used to plot co-ordinates on earth. In Science, the children have thoroughly enjoved learning about electricity and building their own electrical circuits.

### Year 5

### Stargazer

This half term, the Year 5 theme is Stargazers. In Science, we have been learning all about our solar system, and to help us we had a visit from the Space Dome.

We had a lot of fun watching the stars projected above us and seeing how they appear to move as the earth spins on its axis. We also learned why we have day and night, why there are four seasons and why the moon seems to change its shape over 28 days. We also learned the some story of of the constellations, and how to spot them in the night sky. We asked lots of questions and found out that stars burn different colours, depending how hot they are!

### Peter and the Wolf

This term, Year 5 were very lucky to be invited to attend a performance at the Charles Cryer Theatre, of 'Peter and the Wolf' by Sergei Prokofiev. The children have all listened to the music before, but to see it performed on instruments whilst also listening to the story being told, was a fantastic experience for them. Each instrument was played by a different musician, two of these being David Brooker and Elizabeth Andrews, who teach the violin and the 'cello at Barrow Hedges.



Each instrument represented a different character in the story, and after the performance. the children were questioned to see if they recognised the instruments. The Year 5s did us very proud, and the musicians were so impressed with their prior musical knowledge. After the performance, we even had the opportunity to hold some of the instruments! We had such a great time and are very grateful to have had the opportunity to eniov an afternoon of classical music.



## Year 6 - VICTORIAN DAY

We really enjoyed the Victorian workshop that the teachers organised for us.



A lady came in to teach us about the Victorian Era and we played a few games: freeze

frames, mudlarking and acting like Queen Victoria. Creating freeze frames was very entertaining.



Our visitor would call out an action or item such as the telephone and the coronation of Queen Victoria and we would have to create it with our bodies.







She taught us about how the River Thames was full of

sewage! Did vou know children made money by searching for lost trinkets in the river? Unfortunately, they would usually find rat carcasses! We acted out this activity which was known as mudlarking. Furthermore. she told us about a range of important figures and events from the Victorian Era: the story of Dr Barnardo and how he set up 96 homes for desolate children; a visit from Mr Bumble (a nearby Victorian workhouse owner) who read out rules and punishments and some of the inventions from manv the Great Exhibition. It was а great way to finish our half learning about term Victorians.






