
The Expected Level of Development


Children at the expected level of development will:


- Say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs.
- Read words consistent with their phonic knowledge by sound-blending.
- Read aloud simple sentences and books that are consistent with their phonic knowledge, including some common exception words. (ELG for reading)




At Barrow Hedges we have created our own robust systematic synthetic phonics programme using Pearson's Bug Club Phonics progression of sounds and decodable books.











We use a multisensory approach to enable our children to know more and remember more. We bring the learning to life through our use of songs, stories, videos and physical props to enhance our teaching.

Children need to be active in their learning.

The Jolly Phonics songs and actions support the children to recall taught phonemes.










We identify the different sounds in words, starting with CVC words.

The phonics lessons we deliver follow a specific teaching sequence in order for the learning to link and for children to make the best possible progress.

We use an 'I, we, you' approach.

Phonics Vocabulary

Phoneme = sound we hear

Grapheme = letter we read or write

Digraph = two letters together that makes one sound

Split digraph = when the sound splits and has another letter (consonant) in-between the sound

Trigraph = three letters together that makes one sound

Phoneme button = used for single sounds

Phoneme line = used for digraphs/trigraphs
Pure sounds
Sight words



Phonics Homework

Dear Parents and Carers,

Please encourage your child to participate in the activities provided.

This week we have been learning about 's', 'a', and 't'. Please let your child watch the two video links before watching Mrs Bennett's videos.

1. Join in and sing The Phonics Song https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=BEUZKpirZs 🗹 2. Join in and sing The Tricky word Song https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=TvMyssfAluxo 🗗 3. Join in with Mrs Bennett's video of flashcards and object sorting, 4. Go on a sound hunt around your house to find as many objects as you can that begin with 's,' a' and 't'. S. Join in with Mrs Bennett's oral segmenting and blending. (This is where we look at a picture/object and sound out the words to hear the beginning, middle and end sounds.) 6. Have a go at your own rainbow writing for 's', 'a' and 't'.

Super Challenge: Can you have a go at writing some words with 's', 'a' and 't'? For example, 'sat', 'ant', 'tap'. Remember to stretch the words out to hear the beginning, middle and end sounds. Please encourage your child to use their phonic knowledge. Do not worry about correct spelling!

Please do take photos and/or videos of your child completing their homework. Please upload your child's learning on to Tapestry for your child's class teacher to see by Thursday 14th October.

Learning 'Tricky Words'

Children learn tricky words through practise and repetition.

Revisit them over and over again, but make it fun!

Play games

When you are reading, if your child doesn't recognise a word and is stuck, please do read the word to them.







Sharing your child's reading book together. Top Tips!

- Make a prediction about the story based on title, front cover and blurb.
- Turn the pages carefully looking at the pictures to get an understanding of the story before you begin to read it.
- Ensure that your child points to each word as they read.
- Allow the children to use the picture clues to help them to establish meaning.
- Practice reading the tricky words in the text ('the', 'he', 'we' etc.) Can they find them and point to them? Or draw their attention to any sounds you know they know!
- Answer questions in response to the text.
- Identify what they liked and disliked about the text supported by your questioning.
- Support your child to develop an understanding of the characters, setting, and events.
- · Look at the differences between fiction and non fiction.
